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Sierra County Reflects, Honors And Gives Thanks

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Three 9/11 memorial events were held Friday across Sierra County to mark the 25th anniversary of the Sept. 11, 2001 Islamic attacks against our nation. Residents gathered throughout the day to honor those who were killed, recognize the courage and sacrifice of first responders and reflect on how the tragedy continues to shape the nation a quarter-century later.

The day's observances began at the New Mexico State Veterans' Home, where a morning gathering brought residents, staff members, public officials and community members together over coffee and donuts. Music and guest speakers helped set a respectful tone for the program, which centered on remembrance, public service and the lasting importance of supporting those who respond when their communities are in danger.

Elephant Butte Fire Chief Roger Long, Sierra County Sheriff Josh Baker and state Representative Rebecca Dow shared their experiences and reflections with those in attendance. Dow's emotional comments reminded us that along with all the lives lost, there are still those who suffer

from the effects of that day who still need our help and support. Their participation connected the national remembrance to local service, underscoring the daily responsibilities carried by fire-fighters, law enforcement officers, emergency medical personnel, veterans and others who answer calls for help.

Later, a procession of emergency vehicles traveled along Butte Boulevard in Elephant Butte. The moving display gave residents another opportunity to take part in the remembrance and to recognize the men and women serving in local emergency-response agencies. Roadside spectators waved enthusiastically as the vehicles passed, turning the route into a visible expression of appreciation for the community's first responders.

The day concluded at the 9/11 Memorial in Williamsburg, where attendees gathered shortly after sunset. In the evening quiet, participants reflected on where they had been when news of the attacks reached them, remembered the nearly 3,000 people killed in New York, at the Pentagon and near Shanksville, Pennsylvania, and considered the losses borne by families, survivors and first responders.

Those gathered also spoke

Building Your Child's Education Fund, One Brick At A Time
Every solid house starts with a good blueprint and a strong foundation. Saving for a child's education is very similar.
College costs can seem daunting. In addition to tuition, you'll need to account for housing and food, books and supplies, transportation and other expenses. The average annual budget at an in-state public university runs around \$30,990 today, and a private school is \$65,470 according to the College Board. While most families won't pay a college's list price, you'll still want to start saving as early as possible to be ready when your child is.
Lay the foundation early. You don't have to wait until you have the perfect set of plans to start building. There are specific accounts designed to save for education and some do not require a minimum opening deposit. Setting up automatic recurring contributions, even modest ones, lets you build steadily over time without requiring constant attention.
As your child ages, look for ways to redirect expenses you no longer have towards the build. For example, daycare costs, which can exceed \$1,000 a month, can be shifted into a college savings account once your child enters school. Tax refunds and annual bonuses make excellent additional contributions. And others can pitch in – instead of birthday or holiday toys, ask grandparents or relatives to contribute directly to a college savings account.
Know the size of the house you're building. Families saving for community college followed by two years at a public university might target around \$65,000. Those aiming for four years at a public school are looking at roughly \$100,000.
