

Against Philosophy and on the Catholic Church's Infallibility

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To a popular Irish influencer:

His (Mr. X's) biggest heresy is he has an air of philosophy with him, so that's what I went after. Though after looking into his other videos, he can be very down to earth and isn't too high minded (into mma/sport, having a pint). He seems to be very close to what Br Richard teaches on politics. I will pm a video of him to Richard, if he has time, see what he thinks,

This was my message to him:

I felt the need to send you this message, it's a once off. Whether you heed the advice or not, I will support you from a distance as a lesser evil just like the other nationalists, though you are better than most. I have watched more of your videos. Impressive stuff, but not without criticism. Oddly you are very close to what our spiritual ruler's teachings on socialism and crony capitalism (though I'm sure there is nuance, I don't have your vocab on such things).

My criticism lies in a very simple concept - philosophy is the love of wisdom, thus there can only be one true philosophy, all others are false (many of which you entertain). Sinful philosophy is never happy when truth is reached, it seeks further because there is no love for truth, but love of self, idolatry of the mind, questions never end. By definition God is above human reason, like the mysteries of the Trinity or the Eucharist, we can only know so much on these mysteries, otherwise trying to be God - "Come to me as little children" Christ (Mat 18:1-5) - the simplest of men should be able to find God (as God is love), it is not depended on the intellect. It is not an intellectual endeavour in principle, not to say the intellect is bad, but it can be idolised like anything else.

Since truth is absolute, God revealed his truth to men (he would not be loving otherwise). All men have the natural law in their hearts, but the supernatural knowledge of God, 'the supernatural divine law' comes through Christ, who gave us a Church that is infallible (through hierarchy), who teaches us the divine law. This is key because representatives of God must claim infallibility (and hierarchy), otherwise who cares what they think, they've already admitted they can be wrong. The true Church must claim infallibility with a hierarchy (where the buck stops, thus the end of potential disagreement) and there is only one that does, the true Catholic Church.

The next step is testing the spirits; by that infallible truth (dogmas of the magisterium), you can tell who is from God or not (1John 4:1). You then realise we have no Catholic priests in Ireland (which alludes to why we are under a deep curse, which explains a lot about our history) and we have not had a true pope for a long time (much further back than all sede trads that you met, it's a process of elimination, these false trads are slothful and idolise men (especially after seeing the evidence). Odd note: Remember numbers do not mean anything, Jesus said this often (In particular Mat 7:13-14: "Enter ye in at the narrow gate: for wide is the gate, and broad is the way that leadeth to destruction, and many there are who go in thereat. How narrow is the gate, and strait is the way that leadeth to life: and few there are that find it!" Fear God, pray to him that you may know him, make it an honest prayer, do it now and every day with a good honest heart and you will find the truth, us, the last remnant of true Catholicism "The fear of God is the beginning of wisdom" (Prov:1:7)

At this point there is a lot to unpack, maybe we can meet for a chat/pint someday (in Dublin, you have my email). But to conclude on sinful philosophy, and a book link for you. The only true wisdom is the Catholic faith, all others are false or teach half truths. Take the bad out of Plato (regarding faith/morals - not secular science), and you're left with Catholicism. Plato does not own the truth he stumbled upon, only God and his Catholic Church do. There is only salvation inside the Catholic Church (this is dogma, thus heresy to reject - though natural questions arise, like on 'the pagan on the island' with no knowledge of the divine law (how is he saved, why would God ignore him), this has to do with a good understanding of predestination and free will-ultimately, the simple man accepts dogmas in faith (the evils of the world can be explained, why God allows suffering etc, etc). I will leave you with a quote from St. Paul and a book on The Hellenization of Christianity, you will get a fully referenced view on philosophy from the Catholic magisterium (don't be fooled by the false philosophers like anti-saint Aquinas). St. Paul says, "Beware lest any man cheat you by philosophy and vain deceit; according to the tradition of men, according to the elements of the world, and not according to Christ" (Col 2:8) He was talking about the Hellenistic philosophers, not true wisdom of which is absolute, the debate ends with Christ and his Catholic Church.
